Wood dust	All wood dust is carcinogenic with some hardwoods, MDF and treated timbers being especially problematic. Asthma and other lung disease can be caused by wood dust.	We have dust extraction on power tools, which is generally fairly effective in capturing most of the large and small particles produced. The new donated small belt sander and the lathes do not have extraction. The veterans may not yet be using dust extraction on hand held jigsaws.	Trustees have agreed to buy dust masks, RF to do this + sign on new machine – dust masks needed on this machine. Trustees also need to consider whether our hand held sanders and members who bring their own sanders and jigsaws need further control.	RF + trustees	Dec 2023	
Noise	Planer thicknesser and table saw are especially noisy (up to 98dB) and likely to cause hearing loss when used over a long time. Other machinery including hand held jigsaws can also be uncomfortably noisy.	This has been discussed at the AGM. We have agreed it is a condition of membership to use hearing protectors. Trustees have also considered restricting times for using these machines and understood that noise enclosure may be possible and that some low noise tooling is also available. Machinery	Members risk serious and possibly fatal cut injuries following contact with moving parts of machinery, particularly saw blades. Kickback on the table saw and planer can result in serious injury.	Machine guards in place and generally seem to be used. Experienced users and trustees do check they are in place, though a less experienced user on one occasion did have the planer partly unguarded resulting in a minor cut. (see accident book) Face visors available for eye protection – though some members forget to use them. The HSE advice on fence position on the table saw was new to some of us and is being adopted.	When teaching the less experienced we must emphasise their need for future advice. RF to add labels 'Not Sure/ please ask' Establish who is experienced and willing to supervise. Continue to remind members to use eye protection. Add label: Position of fence on the table saw not to overlap blade by more than tooth depth.	Experienced members RF to add labels	Ongoing	
Electrical	Members could get electric shocks or burns from using faulty electrical equipment.	RCD built into main switchboard. We test donated electrical tools. Dennis and Brian have checked and repaired several pieces of equipment. Electrical installation check recently.	Continue to check tools as we use them.	All members	Ongoing
